ILLNESSES: WHEN TO KEEP CHILDREN HOME

School attendance has always been positively linked with student achievement, so it is not always an easy decision to keep a sick child at home. Oftentimes keeping a sick child home results in some parents missing work. However, in the following instances sick children truly need to stay home in the care of an adult in order to recuperate and avoid spreading the illness at school:

- * **Fever** Any fever of 100 degrees or higher should dictate the child not attend school until they have been **fever free for 24 hours** without the aid of ibuprofen or Tylenol.
- * **Diarrhea/Vomiting** Children with these symptoms should be kept home until they have been symptom free for 24 hours.

* **Cough** — Deep and uncontrollably coughing children belong at home even without a fever. For more information, please contact your family health care provider.


we are very proud of our school and view this as another opportunity to show off the great things happening here daily. For opportunities to volunteer at NH-M, please call the school at 445-2421.

NEW TECHNOLOGY ARRIVES AT NH-M



NH-M is excited to unveil new technology available for students purchased with Federal grant funding (Title II). The SMART classroom responders allow students to input answers to teacher-created assessments on the SMART-boards on a device similar to "texting" on a cell phone. Results are instantaneous feedback for students as they can immediately see visually how well they performed. Teachers can also utilize this technology to increase student engagement, while constantly assessing for student mastery. The 4th grade student pictured to the right described using the responders as "fun."
